

The 475th 1996 Reunion Cruise

In October 65 members of the 475th Ftr. Gp. sailed away from Ft. Lauderdale for a week of cruising and reunioning aboard the Celebrity Line ship "Century". The ship was something to behold. It was 800 feet long with a displacement of 70,000 ton. It held thousands of passengers and seemed to be pretty close to being full. The people were housed on 9 of its 12 decks. It was so large it was 4 days before we felt confident enough to walk out of our cabins without a map.

The ship was really amazing with all the latest technical advances. Stabilizers made sure you barely felt any rolling. It appeared to have 3 bow thrusters and 2 stern ones. This made it able to turn 180 degrees in its own length. In Nassau we turned around and backed into the pier. In It. Lauderdale it pulled up alongside the pier but about 30° out from it. It then moved sideways against the pier. Truly a marvel of modern technology.

Our travel agent, Bruce, did an outstanding job for us and is to be commended. Not only did he get an exceptionally good price for us, with automatic up-grades, but every cabin got a bottle of champagne and he threw a cocktail party for us. On top of that he made sizable contributions to our museum fund. The group is beholden to him.

The accommodations were great. The rooms were spacious especially when compared to other ship's cabins. They were kept immaculate with an unending supply of clean towels and other amenities. The stewards were very quick to respond to any request and very helpful.

The two level dining room was a sight to behold. Our group was seated together on the upper level. A good thing we were because the ship was so huge with so many people we rarely bumped into each other except at

our scheduled meetings and dinner. The food in the dining room was excellent, AAA would give it at least 4 stars. The service was nothing short of superb. We must have used at least 8 plates and 14 pieces of silver for every dinner. The waiters and bus boys really knew their jobs. However to expedite things many of us grabbed our breakfast and lunch in their cafeteria, Islands Cafe, where besides serving these 2 meals coffee and tea were available almost all the time. At lunch time there was also a hotdog/hamburger bar by the pool.

The cruise itself was a typical Caribbean cruise only more so because of the size of the ship. We visited San Juan, St. Thomas & St. Johns, St. Martens and Nassau. There were tours sold for every port in which we stopped. There were activities going on all over the ship almost non-stop. You were never more than a few feet from a bar as there were 8 of them. If you stopped for 30 seconds someone was there trying to sell you a drink. There was a casino for those who wanted to try their luck. No one seems to have broken the bank. There were at least a dozen shops selling "duty free" merchandise. The ship was actually a tremendous floating hotel/resort.

Unfortunately there were hundreds of Frenchmen aboard. Naturally they only understood English when it was to their advantage. They always had trouble finding the rear end of a line. They acted like typical Frenchmen and made life uncomfortable for those who tried to be polite.

Most afternoons we gathered in the Hemisphere Lounge forward on the 12th deck. Here we could chat and reminisce. The stories flew thick and fast. As usual the wives wondered how we ever won the war. They talked about the time John Babel almost got his tail in a crack for taking off to go gold mining in New Guinea. He found some too. PJ had a few of his wild tales. Often it seemed like it was the old game, "Can You Top This". The fact the Carl King had kept a diary which was recently published was brought out. The diary will be in the museum for those who are interested.

Just before the Captain's Dinner we gathered in the lobby which was a 3 story atrium of shops and had our group picture taken. As it was a gala affair we were all in our best bib and tucker. It was probably the best attended meeting we had. And now it is history.

PROGRESS REPORT




Service-Superb. ship - immaculate. Food-Excellent. Great ship & great week.

We are now on our one and only cruise and we love it. It gave us a chance to get together with the 475th Ftr. Gp.







A Gallant Foe

The 475th Ftr. Gp and its Museum have been honored by a donation and a visit from a former foe. Lt. Gen Masaji Takahashi (Ret) was a Japanese pilot during WWII and fought against the 475th Ftr. Gp. over the skies of Manila 52 years ago. Following the War Takahashi remained in service and in 1956 served as defense attache at Japan's Embassy in the U.S.A. He retired from the military in 1972 as a Lt. Gen. He then went on to become a corporate executive.

In the past few years he has renewed contacts with our group only on a friendlier basis. He has exchanged visits with some of our members both here and in Japan. Last year he wanted to honor his former enemies and donated to the 475th Museum. In December of 1996 he was able to accompany Pete Madison on a tour of the facility.
