The 22nd 475th Fighter Group Reunion with the P38 National Association Grand Reunion

Trom May 24-28,2000, the Twenty-second 475th Fighter Group Reunion was held in conjunction with the "P38 **National Association** Grand Reunion 2000". This event included all P38 Squadrons and Groups from WWII. Our P38 excelled in high altitude, low altitude, and long range operations, and in action as a Fighter, Dive Bomber, Strafer, and Photo Recon (These people called it an F5). This is the only aircraft that fought in every theater of operation during WWII.

The 1000 plus attendees registering for the reunion thus represented individuals who had seen action in the Aleutions, Burma, China, North Africa, England and Europe, New Guinea, the Solomons, the Philippines, Japan—you name it —they were there.


Headquarters for this all encompassing event was the spectacular Wyndham Hotel in sunny Palm Springs, California.

Registration was scheduled for Wednesday the 24th and Thursday





the 25th. Activities started with the usual scheduled golf on the morning of the 24th (but don't think any of this gang has been physically capable in the last four or five reunions to play). History of this Newsletter

May 25th— History Panel

On the Thursday morning of May 25th, as the schedule pointed out, there was a History Panel of highly decorated P38 panelists reliving their stories of WWII. Our 475th **Perry Dahl** (PJ to those who can't spell Perry), was one of the dignitaries providing his usual humorous and enlightening spiel.

It is noted here, that it is a trick to keep the newsletter primarily about the 475th. The scheduled activity of the P38 National Association Grand Reunion (P38NAGR) controlled the entire reunion. The large number of attendees, and their various squadrons and groups, made it difficult to retain the closeness we had at previous 475thFG reunions.

However, the panelist stories and the camaraderie among these speakers made a comical and historical mixture of entertainment.

Guided Tours

In the afternoon a guided bus tour of Coachella Valley in Palm Springs meandered through the foothills by the homes of the rich and the famous—Bob Hope, Debbie Reynolds, Liz Taylor, Dinah Shore, and others.

May 26th— March Field Museum

Friday the 26th, and the registering continued. Still looking for those faces. Today, the buses were headed for March Field. This aging mob swarmed over the 475th Historical Museum, the P38 National Association Tony Levier Museum and Hangar, where both a P38 and P51 were on display, and the March Field Museum. A huge outdoor tent was set up fully equipped with tables and chairs for all to relax while nibbling on their box lunches.

Standing or walking around outside in the desert temperatures made strolling through the airconditioned museums an additional delight. Of course, the first delights are the pictures and artifacts so perfectly displayed in our 475th Museum, and one marvels at the unbelievable number of hours of work and love that pampers our history of WWII. In the midst of it all this history, we were honored to be saluted by a military fly-by. Talk about organization—this reunion had it all.







P38 Cockpit Replica

Right outside of the hospitality room, set up in the hallway for all to see and admire, was a fiberglass full-size replica of a P38 cockpit—instruments and all.

And outside in the parking lot was it's enclosed trailer with all four sides displayed in spectacularly realistic colored paintings of our P38. In the words of Lee Northrop-Pete Madison and Stan Jones, our Group Chaplain and Aviation Artist, brainstormed the graphics on the trailer. The artwork was from a painting Stan did of a McGuire mission. The same mission in which Pete flew through the rigging of the Japanese ship. This is also reflected in the painting. Pete and Anne own the original painting. The graphics on the trailer are called vinyl graphics, basically one very large decal wrapped around the trailer. A company called Downey Decal did the work.

This masterpiece replica P38 cockpit, was built for the 475th FG by our Museum Director, Lee Northrop. None of us knew until now, that he was a master at fiberglass productions. The cameras of hundreds of the attendees were constantly clicking and flashing at this outstanding surprise to all. Well done, Lee! We are all proud of you, and what more can we say.

May 27th— Palm Springs Air Museum

Saturday morning the 27th of May had squadron and group business meetings from 8:00 AM to 9:30 AM. The 475th had a meeting to temporarily reorganize

the Board of Directors and other items in the absence of Pete Madison. Our Museum Director Lee Northrop must again be recognized for his continuing service during this period.

After these meetings we set off on our tour of the Palm Springs Air Museum. Again, the bus ride was an ideal excuse for talking and getting to know each other better. The passengers remarked that they hadn't seen **Liz Purdy** asleep on any of these bus tours this year.

Upon arrival, we were greeted by this enormous building. This Palm Springs Air Museum is a monstrous 50,000 square foot open area displaying over twenty WWII Aircraft in flyable and mint condition, plus shining antique cars parked here and there for all the world to enjoy. So much to see that it was overwhelming. To think that one man, Bob Pond, built and owns this entire operation is unbelievable. What a marvelous tribute to aviation! This man was one of the speakers at the Grand Banquet to come.

Huge murals on the walls honoring famous people as well as aircraft—one was so large that is shows a naval aircraft carrier at sea with a plane approaching it's flight deck—beautifully done! People were milling around, and taking zillions of pictures, thoroughly enjoying every minute of this outstanding museum.

Amongst the goings-on, there was a set-up for an impromptu P38 pilot symposium in another elegant hangar. Our Jack Purdy was part time MC for this interesting affair. There must have been four to five hundred chairs set up to face the speakers. **Jack Purdy** trapped yours truly into telling his

impromptu story of a ten-day trek through the jungles of New Britain many years ago.

While at this magnificent museum, Steve Hinton from the Planes of Fame Air Museum in Chino, California, gave us a surprise by taking off in a P38 right under our noses, and putting on an airshow flying the P38 "Jolting Josie". Once again cold chills ran up and down your back to the sweet sound of the twin Allison engines as he kept making low passes over the crowd who were madly taking pictures. After landing, he taxied again right up under our noses to park. It was great!

Buses returned us to the hotel and we prepared for the cocktail hour (social hour to some) and then the Grand Banquet.

Grand Banquet

When we originally registered into the hotel, we were permitted to reserve seating assignments with tablemates of our own squadron, and again the 475th snuggled together surrounded by the mass of people from the other groups. In the midst of the banquet a successful raffle was taking place for the benefit of the P38 National Association. again, our Museum Director, **Lee Northrop**, had to get into the act by holding up the raffled items for all to see.

After the banquet trappings were cleared away, the President of the P38 National Association, **Jack Purdy** our 475th member, gave his friendly and comical welcoming speech. Then acting as Master of Ceremonies introduced the following evening's distinguished scheduled speakers.

Ed Maloney, Founder and Director of the "Planes of Fame" Air Museum at Chino, California. The first Aviation Museum on the west Coast.

These speakers had mindboggling credentials in the establishment of aviation history and were the highlight of the banquet festivities.







Tom McGuire Enshrinement

Another must for this newsletter—The Enshrinement of **Tom McGuire** into the **National Aviation Hall of Fame.** This was another impressive event on Friday July 14 and Saturday July 15, 2000. Every member of the 475th received an invitation.

The NAHF President's Dinner was Friday evening. They had the dinner tables setup under the wings of the aircraft in the United States Air Force Museum, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, in Dayton, Ohio. Over 300 people attended this wonderful affair.

The next evening on Saturday the 15th, over 1000 people attended the Enshrinement Ceremonies at the Dayton Convention Center in Dayton, Ohio. A formal banquet event with the Ladies looking glamorous in their formal gowns and the men in their tuxedos looking like a massive penguin farm.

The inductees for the Year 2000 were Buzz Aldrin, astronaut—2nd man on the moon; Gene Cernan, astronaut—last man on the moon; Laurence Cragie, first American Military Jet Pilot; and the 475th FG's Tom McGuire, 2nd leading Fighter Ace of WWII.

The Master of Ceremonies was no-other than **Joe Foss**, Marine Ace of the Guadacanal days, Medal of Honor recipient, 1984 NAHF enshrinee, and twice Governor of South Dakota.

Representing the 475th were John Loisel, Jack Purdy, Joe Forster, Jack "Fox" Olson, Tom "Bud" Oxford, Roger Palmer, Dave Berby, Guy "Hap" Smith, Doug Thropp, and yours truly

Glen "Jake" Jeakle.

The overall grandeur of the ceremonies was totally impressive. Even Tom McGuire himself would be totally impressed.

At one point during the ceremonies, Jack Purdy speaking for the 475th called Joe Price to the podium to recall his story of Colonel Mac threatening his survival if anything were to happen to Lindbergh on a certain mission when Joe had been assigned as his wingman. Joe squirmed his way through to the delight of all.

Our 432nd and later Group Commander, John Loisel was the presenter of the Enshrinement Medal for Tom McGuire, and Jack Purdy was the recipient, who on the following week delivered it to the 475th Museum at March Field. No living relative of Tom could be found to accept the Enshrinement Medal, therefore the decision to award it to Jack in Tom's name.

Sitting with us at our dinner table was the current Vice Commander CO of McGuire Air Force Base, Colonel Clarence D. Smith Jr. Among the other many notables were Ted Williams, baseball great and Marine Fighter Pilot; Joe Kittenger, a past ANHF Enshrinee who parachuted from over 100,000 feet, 80,000 feet of it free fall, and an ex-squadron mate of "Hap" Smith; and also Cliff Roberts, movie idol (or at least my wife thought so), also a past President of the ANHF.

It is a shame that all the 475th members could not have attended this once-in-a-lifetime tribute for one of our Squadron CO's.


In Memory

Sadly the next subject affects us all. Our **Pete Madison** had a stroke just prior to the Grand Reunion and thus his absence. A few short weeks later we lost our Pete.

The following written by PJ Dahl must be included as part of our 475th history.

To all personnel: Pete's memorial conducted on his 77th birthday, 30 Oct was a truly beautiful Tribute to him as his friends filled to overflowing the P38 hangar. The program orchestrated by his son Chris, with able assistance of Lee Northrop, included memories related to a series of speakers who covered various facets of Pete's life. At Colonel MacDonald's request I read a eulogy he had prepared, praising Pete's contributions to the 475th FG in war as in peace. No one can replace Pete in his quest to perpetuate the legacy of the 475th, but I ask your support as we transition to the post Pete era. We all owe it to him to carry on where he left off. To those of you who did not attend the memorial, Anne plans on attending the Alabama reunion so you may convey your best wishes to her then—check 6 pj.

PJ continues: as the strains of "Amazing Grace" and other Highland bagpipe music filled the air, it was evident that this memorial service was going to be one to remember. Hundreds of Pete Madison's friends sat amidst P38 memorabilia to pay tribute to this one of a kind man who did so much in peace as in war. Following a moving message by son Chris Madison, an unseen vocal group sang "By a New Guinea Waterfall" a song Pete used to sing



to his young, growing son. Various friends spoke of remembrances, a tribute to how Pete touched so many.

Colonel MacDonald prepared this eulogy message and asked PJ Dahl to read it in his absence....

For those of us who served in the 475th Ftr. Gp through the southwest Pacific Area, old mother nature is taking a much closer look at the clock ticking down. Nevertheless, when we lose someone like "Pete Madison" we are particularly distressed. For here was a friend, courageous in war, astute in the business world, and a great friend to his comrades. He did more than his share to make the world a better place. We are all diminished by his passing. Maybe best expressed by the words of the poet John Donne...."Send not to know for whom the bell tolls. It tolls for thee".

PJ continues, all through the years, Pete never lost his love for the P38, the unit he served and especially for the people responsible for it's achievements. His zeal to ensure the preservation of the 475th Fighter Group legacy is well known to all of us. No member of the 475th was untouched by his determination.

How could any of us refuse his requests to assist in his quest; this quest to establish the 475th Fighter Group Historical Foundation, to ensure reunions, to build and operate our very own museum. It is indeed incumbent on each of us to do what we can to help fill the void created by Pete's departure. It is the least we can do to honor him and his efforts.

To add to our list of fallen warriors:

Ken Troxel Andrew Tsinhnahjinnie Cal Wire Ronald J. Yamka

Cal's departure was since the Grand Reunion. He was my friend and also CO of the 433rd. It hurts.

A last minute note from PJ Dahl dated Jan. 30. Bob Weary passed away on Jan. 29, 2001. Bob, in addition to being a gallant warrior with the 475th Fighter Group, was a stalwart in perpetuating the legacy of the group. He has donated thousands of dollars directty in support of the 475th's various activities. He established the 475th FG Historical Foundation, Inc., and continued to insure that certain aspects of the group remained as a non-profit organization to preclude expensive tax implications.

The legal advice given, always pro bono, by his firm was and will continue to be an invaluable asset to our organization. His contributions as a cherished friend and fellow warrior will not be forgotten. Our prayers to out to Dale and the rest of his family and close associates.

433rd Squadron

The following is for the benefit of the 433rd Squadron and has been copied from the December 2000 issue of Lightning Strikes.

Perry J. Dahl, Colonel (retired)

Born 18 February 1923, Colonel Dahl enlisted in the army infantry branch as an enlisted man in 1940. He applied for aviation

cadet training and graduated as a second lieutenant in June 1943. He served in the SW Pacific where as a P-38 pilot he downed nine enemy aircraft in air to air combat. His assignments include: Vice Commandant of Cadets, United States Air Force Academy; Air Staff, Headquarters Air Force; Deputy Chief of Staff North American Air Defense Command; and flew two tours in Vietnam as Commander of a Forward Air Control unit and as Wing Commander, 56th Special Operations Wing.


A Command Pilot, Colonel Dahl's decorations include: Silver Star, Legion of Merit Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, Air Medal with 15 oak leaf clusters, Air Force Commendation Medal, Purple Heart, Presidential Unit Citation with one oak leaf cluster, Good Conduct Medal, Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm and numerous service ribbons.

Colonel Dahl retired in 1978 with his wife the former Barbara Cox of Seattle, Washington. They currently reside in Florida.




John Loisel-McGuire Enshrinement The presenter of the Medal


